Dear Brothers & Sisters of Our Lady of Lourdes, I pray you are blessed in this new year of 2025. This Sunday, we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord, a reminder that we are all made new in God's forgiveness and mercy.

[__01__] Time's Acceleration and the New Year's

Tradition The passage of time often feels as though it speeds up, accelerating as though driven by an unseen force. It's a common sentiment that time flies faster the older we get. This sensation contrasts starkly with the New York City Times Square ball drop—a tradition meant to mark the beginning of a new year. Unlike our perception of time, the ball's descent is mechanically controlled, moving at a constant pace rather than following the natural laws of gravity.

This discrepancy highlights our yearning to control time, to slow it down or even reverse it. As the years go by, we often long to be time travelers, turning back the clock to revisit cherished moments.

[__02_] Time Travel Through Storytelling During the holidays, families gather to share stories from the past, reliving moments that bind them together. Repeating these stories, especially to someone who hasn't heard them before, feels like reclaiming time.

Recently, my family rediscovered a VHS tape of my surprise 50th birthday for my father over 30 years ago. Watching it was like freezing time, allowing us to revisit his joy and humor. Even my father was amused to see himself back then, marveling at how he made everyone endure the opening of his gifts. Storytelling and revisiting old memories help us to momentarily step out of the relentless march of time.

[__03_] The Jubilee Year: A Time of Mercy In the Catholic tradition, every 25 years is celebrated as a Jubilee of Mercy, a practice rooted in ancient Jewish customs.

The Jubilee, described in Leviticus 25, was a time for forgiveness, renewal, and returning to right relationships with God and others.

In the Catholic Church, these Jubilees emphasize mercy, solidarity, and reconciliation. The upcoming year, 2025, is a designated Jubilee year. It calls us to reflect on God's providence and mercy, reminding us to seek forgiveness and extend it to others as we journey through life.

[__04_] Mary: A Model of Reflection Luke 2:19 tells us that Mary "kept all these things, reflecting on them in her heart." Prayer, like Mary's reflection, allows us to pause time and focus on God's Word.

The Holy Family experienced time challenges too. For instance, when Jesus stayed behind in the temple, Mary and Joseph searched for him with great anxiety. This moment foreshadowed the separation and suffering Mary would endure as Jesus fulfilled his mission. Despite knowing her son's destiny, Mary trusted in God's plan, making her a model of hope and reflection. Through prayer and trust in God, we too can hold back time and gain clarity in our lives.

[__05__] Reflecting on God's Mercy in the New Year January 1 offers a unique opportunity to pause and reflect on God's mercy. While it is always appropriate to seek forgiveness, the Jubilee year magnifies this call.

As Pope Francis proclaimed, 2025 is a year of mercy and hope. It invites us to deepen our faith and embrace God's forgiveness. By doing so, we align our hearts with the spirit of renewal and mercy that defines this sacred time.

[__06__] A Call to Repentance and Forgiveness

The Gospel emphasizes repentance alongside belief: "Repent and believe in the Gospel." Similarly, the Our Father teaches us to seek forgiveness and extend it to others: "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us."

As we begin a new year, it's a fitting time to examine our lives, repent, and reconcile. True faith requires action — changing our lives and committing to God's will. Believing and belonging to the Church are excellent resolutions that can guide us toward deeper faith and love.

John Henry Newman wrote about the transformative power of repentance, using the example of Zacchaeus, the tax collector. Zacchaeus didn't merely believe; he acted.

By promising to repay what he had taken dishonestly, he demonstrated true repentance. Newman described this as Zacchaeus trying to "undo the past" and reconcile with God.

[__07__] Turning to Jesus: The Ultimate Timekeeper

While we cannot truly undo the past, Jesus offers a way to redeem it. In small matters, like pressing "undo" on a computer, we feel a sense of control. However, in the serious matters of life and salvation, only Jesus can save us.

Through confession and regular reflection, we can "slow down time" by aligning ourselves with God's eternal plan. By repenting, believing, and resolving to listen to God's Word, we can step into the new year with hope and purpose. Like Mary, let us reflect on God's promises and hold them in our hearts, trusting in His mercy to guide us forward.
